What's new?

In the last edition of Boundless we reported on our new relationship with Cheshire East, detailing changes that would have to be made.

I'm delighted to say that we have carried out the changes and we are continuing in our role.

Our Conversation café is now running on the first Saturday of each month at 10.00 at St Michael's Church. It has been very well attended and has been supported by "One Project Ukraine", so there are always clothes, toiletries and food available.

The Tuesday ESOL class has continued and is being run by our enthusiastic volunteers.

Our precious relationship with Cheshire East Communities team has continued. At present we are working together to support a new Syrian family who have recently moved to Macclesfield. What has pleased us most is that several of our existing Syrian families are also supporting the newcomers. This feels as if we are all working together as one very special team.

I would like to give special thanks to our local schools who have taken refugee children and cared for them. We hear such good reports of all the schools attended by our Syrian, Afghan and Ukrainian children. Thank you all.





Ukrainian Event 9.3.24

On the 9th March 2024 the Ukrainian group organized an event to celebrate the 210th Anniversary of the birth of their national poet Taras Hryhorovych Scevchenko (9.3.1814-10.3.1861)

The group led by Tamara Ihnatieva gave a presentation about the life and work of this poet, author, portrait painter, artist and architect. He was born to a poor family and lost his parents in his early years after which he ended up a serf to a richer family. He eventually received training from another artist who recognized his potential, but it was many years (1838) before he was freed from serfdom to pursue his career. He was also among other things a political activist who was imprisoned by Imperial Russia for his views on Ukrainian Independence, which is very interesting in the light of current events. History repeating itself. He became famous and there are many statues in his honour in Ukraine and across the world.

His life was celebrated with musical performances and reading of his poems and of course this being a Ukrainian celebration there was wonderful food for the body as well as the soul.

One of his poems which has been set to music was played and sung by all, a powerful moment as it is said its strength and power represents the spirit and will of the Ukrainian people.

'The mighty Dnieper River Roars and Bellows.'

The mighty Dnieper roars and bellows The wind in anger howls and raves Down to the ground it bends the willows And mountain-high lifts up the waves

The pale faced moon picks out this moment To peek from behind a cloud Like a canoe upon the ocean It first tips up and then tips down

The cocks don't crow to wake the morning There is not yet a sound of man The owls in glades call out their warnings And Ash trees creak and creak again.

In the book by Amber Poole (Sunflowers at my Table) which Nicky wrote about in the last edition of 'Boundless' there is another poem about exile. Taras was exiled from his homeland for many years as people are being exiled by war now. If you haven't read this book, I would highly recommend it.



Congratulations and well done to all those Ukrainian people who produced this event, set it up and provided the refreshments.

Important information for all Ukrainians.

This message has come from the Cheshire East communities Team. Government has announced the next phase of the Ukraine schemes. There are two main changes to Homes for Ukraine (HFU) that both took effect in respect of applications made to UKVI after 15:00 on 19 February 2024. First, there is a change to visa length. Visas will be granted for 18 months, rather than 36 months as before. The 'thank you payments' will continue for the duration of the guests HFU initial visa permission.

Second, there is a change to sponsor eligibility criteria. Those who sponsor new arrivals must themselves be British or must have settled status (which means have the right to live in the UK permanently). The Government has also announced the closure of the Ukraine Family Scheme (UFS) and the closure of the Ukraine Extension Scheme (UES) on 16 May 2023.

Additionally, the new Ukraine Permission Extension (UPE) Scheme will allow Ukrainian citizens currently in the UK under any of the three Ukraine visa Schemes to extend their stay by 18 months. Ukrainians will be able to apply for UPE three months before the expiry of their existing visa.

Refugees Welcome has a contract with CVS (Council of Voluntary Services Cheshire East) to support some of our core activities. CVS select, train and deploy our volunteers as well as securely holding all our data.

We would like to wish Alex Major from CVS all the very best with the new role she has been seconded to and welcome Estelle Worthington to the team. As part of her wider role as Sector Development Officer, Estelle will be delivering our support services from CVS over the coming months.

Estelle worked for many years in the refugee and asylum advocacy movement, first for Regional Asylum Activism and then for Asylum Matters, where her main role was to help people with direct experience of seeking safety, grassroots support groups, and wider partnerships to campaign for positive changes to the asylum system, particularly around asylum accommodation and access to healthcare.

More recently, Estelle has been a climate justice campaigner, mobilising communities and influencing regional and national decision makers to prioritise climate action. Drawing on her experience of community development and volunteer co-ordination, we are looking forward to working together to support the Refugees Welcome volunteer team, without whose myriad contributions we could not function.

If you would like to include something a bit more informal/ personal we could add: In her spare time Estelle loves gardening and walks in the Peak District with her family, and can often be found sculpting in her workshop in Bollington.



Some more information about how we operate.

Refugees Welcome Cheshire East started nearly 9 years ago, when the Syrian war was at its height. Syrian people were seeking refuge from their war and were living in camps in neighbouring Lebanon. The British government agreed to take a number of vulnerable families under the VPRS (Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Scheme). 5 Syrian families were welcomed to Cheshire East early in 2017. Two further Syrian families have settled in Cheshire East more recently.

Almost three years ago, the Taliban dramatically took over Afghanistan, making life extremely difficult and dangerous for people who had worked in any capacity with UK or US institutions. Many hundreds of people had to leave Afghanistan very quickly. Afghan refugees have been welcomed to the UK under schemes such as the ARAP (Afghan Relocations and Assistance Policy and the ACRS (Afghan Citizens Resettlement Scheme). For the past 2 and a half years 5 Afghan families have lived in permanent accommodation and many more have lived in temporary accommodation locally.

The invasion of Ukraine on 24th February 2022 meant that huge numbers of Ukrainians became refugees. Many Ukrainians are living in Cheshire East.

So.... Who are the people who work for Refugees Welcome?

7 of us are trustees of the charity. That means we run the charity. We make the decisions about policy, activities, finance and how the whole charity operates

We have meetings, along with our treasurer (a very important person!) approximately every 6 weeks. All of us are retired (among us are a GP, a psychotherapist, a counsellor, two teachers, a Chartered Engineer, a person, who worked in banking and one who is a very experienced business man). We all work in a voluntary capacity. We work closely with a team from Cheshire East, although we no longer have a contract with them. We have to report on our activities to the Charity Commission every year.

There are about 50 volunteers who work directly with the refugee families in a wide range of supporting roles. The volunteers also help man the conversation cafés and assist at the ESOL (English for speakers of other languages) classes. Our website is run by one of our volunteers. We are pleased to welcome several of the Ukrainians as new volunteers. The only people who are in paid jobs with our organisation are an employee of CVS (Council for Voluntary Services) and the people who are professional ESOL teachers, who lead the ESOL teaching.

We are fortunate enough to be able to work with other organisations in Cheshire East, who are supporting refugees.

We welcome more volunteers and trustees. Please contact us through our website, if you are interested in working with us. We would especially welcome someone who would like to work on the next edition of Boundless!
