I want to take this opportunity to say thank you — to Reverend Helen Byrne. Almost 8 years ago Helen put a message in the notices at the Methodist Church in Macclesfield. Many of them fled to Lebanon and then many more tried to cross the Mediterranean Sea in small boats.

Helen's notice was to see whether there were people in Macclesfield who would be willing to welcome and care for Syrian refugee families. A group of people started meeting and became the core of Refugees Welcome Cheshire East.

Helen led the group initially and with a few other people did all the ground work on which the current trustees have been able to build. She stepped down as chair of trustees in 2019 but has keenly followed our progress since then.

After 10 years in Macclesfield the time has come for Helen and her family to move on. She will leave Macclesfield in August to take up a new post in Truro, Cornwall. All of us at Refugees Welcome would like to say "Thank you, Helen" with all our hearts. We hope your "heart of gold" will find new outlets in the far south west.

# Refugee Settlement Visit.



A few weeks ago, I was fortunate enough to visit the Tserovani Refugee settlement 20 minutes' drive from Tbilisi, he capital city of Georgia. The settlement of more than 2000 homes was built in 2008 to house approximately 8000 refugees from South Ossetia during the conflict between Georgia and the Russian Federation. It is a purpose built settlement designed to give families basic shelter, services and transport infrastructure.



While I was there, I took part in a workshop making and training people to make enamel jewellery. This is a social enterprise offering training and employment to displaced people. Ana Akhlouri, project manager of the enterprise, wrote the following for Boundless:



### **Background:**

As a result of the Russian-Georgian war in 2008, 26 thousand people became internally displaced persons, (IDPs) and most of them continued to live in settlements for internally displaced persons created after the war in the regions of Mtskheta-Mtianeti and Shida Kartli. The population suffered very heavy material and moral damage. Every year after the war, various types of social or material assistance was

provided, but even after 14 years, the majority of the population is faced with the problem of employment and economic stability.

The Mtskheta-Mtianeti Regional Hub organization, with all its current programs and projects, supports the solution and strengthening of the problems of displaced and war-affected people, at the same time it covers the region where it sees the problem of civic engagement, civic participation in political processes. and access to nonformal youth education.

In 2012 Mtskheta-Mtianeti Regional Hub established Social Enterprise Ikorta. The organization knew the local community well, worked on existing problems and saw that unemployment was the main problem. Especially in the conditions that the displaced people had to live in a completely different reality, to adapt to the new environment. In an environment where most of them could not use their existing knowledge and experience, they would need to look for different job opportunities.

The workshop started its activities with a grant of 700 euros. We bought a stove, a small amount of silver material and enamel paints, and four IDP women learned the technique of cloisonné enamel. These 4 women then became teachers for other displaced women and youth. In total, more than 100 young people have been trained in this technique.

The women who started working with us were not familiar with this technology of creating jewellery, their profession was often not related to art at all, but Ikorta gave them the opportunity to learn a new profession and have an independent source of income.

After the Covid crisis Ikorta employs 9 women, works with two travel agencies, has 3 partner shops in Tbilisi and future plans are to increase the number of employees and build the space for meetings and presentations.

# Some more information about how we operate.

Refugees Welcome Cheshire East started nearly 8 years ago, when the Syrian war was at its height. Syrian people were seeking refuge from their war and were living in camps in neighbouring Lebanon. The British government agreed to take a number of vulnerable families under the VPRS (Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Scheme). 5 Syrian families were welcomed to Cheshire East early in 2017. Two further Syrian families have settled in Cheshire East more recently.

15 months ago, the Taliban dramatically took over Afghanistan, making life extremely difficult and dangerous for people who had worked in any capacity with UK or US institutions. Many hundreds of people had to leave Afghanistan very quickly. Afghan refugees have been welcomed to the UK under schemes such as the ARAP (Afghan Relocations and Assistance Policy and the ACRS (Afghan Citizens Resettlement Scheme). For the past 12 months 5 Afghan have lived in permanent accommodation and many more have lived in temporary accommodation locally.

The invasion of Ukraine on 24<sup>th</sup> February 2022 meant that huge numbers of Ukrainians became refugees. Many Ukrainians are living in Cheshire East.

### So.... Who are the people who work for Refugees Welcome?

8 of us are trustees of the charity. That means we run the charity. We make the decisions about policy, activities, finance and how the whole charity is run. We have meetings, along with our treasurer (a very important person!) approximately every 6 weeks. All of us are retired (among us are a GP, a psychotherapist, a counsellor, two teachers, a Chartered Engineer, a person, who worked in banking and one who has played a number of roles in the NHS) .We all work in a voluntary capacity. We work closely with a team from Cheshire East, whom we meet every 2 weeks. We have to report on our activities to the Charity Commission every year.

There are about 60 volunteers who work directly with the refugee families in a wide range of supporting roles. The volunteers also help man the conversation cafés and assist at the ESOL (English for speakers of other languages) classes. Our website is run by one of our volunteers. We are pleased to welcome several of the Ukrainians as new volunteers. The only people who are in paid jobs with our organisation are an employee of CVS (Council for Voluntary Services) and the people who are professional ESOL teachers, who lead the ESOL teaching.

We are fortunate enough to be able to work with other organisations in Cheshire East, who are supporting refugees.

We welcome more volunteers and trustees. Please contact us through our website if you are interested in working with us. We would especially welcome someone who would like to work on the next edition of Boundless!
