We also had a drumming and singing session by a Syrian family, which got people up and moving. By the end of the afternoon the African and Syrian drummers were drumming together and the dancing was a free for all. What a great sight

to see. So many people enjoying each other's culture.

People from North America and Canada and many different countries in South America plus people from Eastern Europe and Hong Kong. ## Our ESOL students have written contributions about their home cities.

#### My name is Denys.

I am from Ukraine, from the city of Dnipro, which is a city of steel. It is a very large city with more than 1 million people living there. The city is located on the banks of the large Dniper River.

I now live in Bollington in a house and I work in Manchester. I live with my wife and two daughters. We live by the pool and love to go swimming together. We go for a walk to White Nancy.

#### My name is Sergei.

I am from Ukraine. I lived in Ukraine, in the city of Kyiv. Kyiv is the capital city of Ukraine. It is a very big and nice city. It has 4 million people. Kyiv is a very green city. It is an agrarian city and it is Europe's largest producer of grain. Kyiv has a university and museums. It is a very old city – about 1530 years old. In Kyiv there is a large river called the Dnipro. I like my hometown.

#### Viktoriia Chaika

I was born in Dnipro and I want to talk about it. Dnipro is a lovely city in the middle of Ukraine. The name of the city is based on the local river's name. It is very industrial; there are lots of factories and space rocket production. Dnipro has the longest quay in Europe, with a very nice view.

It's quite a new city, just nearly 300 years.

Dnipro is the heart of Ukrainian Jewish culture, with a huge community, a synagogue and a Jewish culture centre, "Menorah".

Also Dnipro has a central railway exchange.

In the war it has become a safe place for thousands of people from occupied territories. The local government is doing a lot to help and support them. Dnipro is a good place to visit, but it would be better to choose a time after the war.



#### Tamara Ihnatiera.

I am from Kyiv. Kyiv is a very green city. There are a lot of parks and gardens. My favourite park is Marinsky Park. It is a quiet place. I like to walk the streets. Kyiv is an old city. It is about 1500 years old. The biggest church is Lavra. It has caves under the temple. Kyiv is the first place for tourists in Ukraine.



I am from Kyiv. It is a big city. Kyiv is the capital of Ukraine. This city is busy because there are a ;lot of people who live and work there. It is a very beautiful city. It has a lot of castles, churches, monasteries, museums and very interesting places.

#### Instructions to your Bank Manager

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In order to Gift Aid your donation you must tick the box

I want to Gift Aid my donation and any donations I make in the future or have made in the past four years to Refugees Welcome.

I am a UK taxpayer and understand that if I pay less Income Tax and/or Capital Gains Tax in the current tax year than the amount of Gift Aid claimed on all my donations it is my responsibility to pay any difference.

Gift Aid is reclaimed by the charity from the tax you pay for the current tax year. Your address is needed to identify you as a current UK taxpayer.

#### Please notify Refugees Welcome if you:

- want to cancel this declaration
- change your name or home address
- no longer pay sufficient tax on your income and/or capital gains

If you pay Income Tax at the higher or additional rate and want to receive the additional tax relief due to you, you must include all your Gift Aid donations on your Self-Assessment tax return or ask HM Revenue and Customs to adjust your tax code.



### Some more information about how we operate.

Refugees Welcome Cheshire East started nearly 8 years ago, when the Syrian war was at its height. Syrian people were seeking refuge from their war and were living in camps in neighbouring Lebanon. The British government agreed to take a number of vulnerable families under the VPRS (Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Scheme). 5 Syrian families were welcomed to Cheshire East early in 2017. Two further Syrian families have settled in Cheshire East more recently.

15 months ago, the Taliban dramatically took over Afghanistan, making life extremely difficult and dangerous for people who had worked in any capacity with UK or US institutions. Many hundreds of people had to leave Afghanistan very quickly. Afghan refugees have been welcomed to the UK under schemes such as the ARAP (Afghan Relocations and Assistance Policy and the ACRS (Afghan Citizens Resettlement Scheme). For the past 12 months 5 Afghan have lived in permanent accommodation and many more have lived in temporary accommodation locally.

The invasion of Ukraine on 24<sup>th</sup> February 2022 meant that huge numbers of Ukrainians became refugees. Many Ukrainians are living in Cheshire East.

#### So.... Who are the people who work for Refugees Welcome?

8 of us are trustees of the charity. That means we run the charity. We make the decisions about policy, activities, finance and how the whole charity is run. We have meetings, along with our treasurer (a very important person!) approximately every 6 weeks. All of us are retired (among us are a GP, a psychotherapist, a counsellor, two teachers, a Chartered Engineer, a person, who worked in banking and one who has played a number of roles in the NHS) .We all work in a voluntary capacity. We work closely with a team from Cheshire East, whom we meet every 2 weeks. We have to report on our activities to the Charity Commission every year.

There are about 60 volunteers who work directly with the refugee families in a wide range of supporting roles. The volunteers also help man the conversation cafés and assist at the ESOL (English for speakers of other languages) classes. Our website is run by one of our volunteers. We are pleased to welcome several of the Ukrainians as new volunteers. The only people who are in paid jobs with our organisation are an employee of CVS (Council for Voluntary Services) and the people who are professional ESOL teachers, who lead the ESOL teaching.

We are fortunate enough to be able to work with other organisations in Cheshire East, who are supporting refugees.

We welcome more volunteers and trustees. Please contact us through our website, if you are interested in working with us. We would especially welcome someone who would like to work on the next edition of Boundless!
